

Budget 2024 Approved Tax Rates Increasing 3.55% After Growth

On January 31st Council approved Budget 2024. Total expenditures in 2024 are pegged at approximately \$19.6 million. Of that total approximately \$10.0 million is operating expenditures while approximately \$9.6 million is capital expenditures.

The 2024 tax levy is increasing 6.07%. Growth, which means the rise in property assessment from 2023 to 2024, accounts for 2.52% of the tax levy increase. Therefore, on average taxpayers will see a 3.55% increase, which is less than the increases many other Ontario municipalities including our neighbors are experiencing in 2024. In Oliver Paipoonge a resident with a property valued @ \$400,000 will see a \$139.00 increase.

Budget 2024 continues emphasis on maintaining the Municipality's capital assets to ensure service needs and expectations of the public can be met. Accordingly, the budget provides \$1.95 million for 3 major and 2 minor vehicles for the Fire Department. Debt will be used to finance \$1.25 million of these acquisitions. There are provisions totalling \$885,000 for a grader and plow truck, which will be purchased without incurring debt. Three major road projects totalling \$2.8 million are paving the Village of Kakabeka Falls road network and rehabilitating significant portions of Vibert and Rosslyn Roads. These three projects will be financed by reissuing debt incurred in 2019 to pave Oliver Road from Murillo to Kakabeka Falls that was paid off in 2023.

Based on record levels of building permits in recent years the Municipality expects growth in assessment to be a significant factor generating tax revenue in future years, which will help Council to moderate tax increases while continuing to meet cost pressures due to inflation and maintain our capital

assets.

CHIEF'S CORNER

March's column of BE PREPARED, will focus on FireSmart. What is FireSmart you ask? It is a program that helps people increase neighbourhood resilience to wildfires, and minimizes the negative impacts associated with wildfires. With 2022 being the most severe wildfire season in Canadian history and throughout the world, coupled with the current low snow amounts, the threat of wildfire is a real danger for anybody living in a rural setting such as Oliver Paipoonge. The reality of wildfires is that they typically overwhelm emergency services. This can happen due to the speed of wildfires and the resources required to protect just one structure. The most effective means to deal with wildfires is through prevention efforts and pre-planned mitigation, at the individual property level, as opposed to large scale emergency response.

I'm in the final stages of writing a Community Wildland Fire Protection Plan (CWFPP). Once completed it will provide some guidance with respect to reducing the negative impacts of wild-fires. One of the main principals behind FireSmart is the concept of a defendable space around your home extending out through your property. Defendable



space is about reducing the amount of fuel available for a wildfire which results in a reduction in fire intensity along with a reduction in fire spread. For instance, you can trim trees to remove low branches, keep grass and shrubs cut back, clean up dead material such as leaves and fallen trees, planting fire-resistive trees and reducing the number conifer trees, which can be extremely volatile in wildfire conditions. If everybody does their part and makes their property a defendable space, the net result is a resilient community.

It is hard to believe March is already here! I really don't know where the time has gone.

March is always the time to start thinking about spring fire hazards. Especially with the current conditions we are experiencing. With such low snowfall amounts this winter so far and well above normal temperatures, we are certainly setting up for a dangerous spring fire season. Spring fires are the most dangerous of all wildfires. Hot, dry, and windy conditions that are typical for springtime, coupled with cured fine fuels such as grass all come together for dangerous conditions. Please take extra care and caution this spring to help reduce the risk to yourself and our community from the threats of wildfires. For those that have burnt wood debris piles over the winter, please ensure that they are out before the snow is gone. With the dry winter conditions there is the risk of what's called a holdover fire. This is a fire that continues to burn long after it is ignited. Once spring conditions arrive, these holdover fires can cause wildfires. You must remember that you are responsible for any fire that you light. If there is a wildfire because of a wood debris pile you have burnt over the winter, you can be responsible for the cost of suppressing a wildfire. April 1st marks the beginning of the fire season, however, on a year such as this, we could be into fire hazards well before the normal April start.

The second big deal with March is Daylight Savings, which will occur on

March 10th this year. Why is that such an important day? It is the day that we should change the batteries in our smoke alarms and CO alarms. Locally we have experienced a couple of house fires with working smoke alarms providing early warning to alert people to get out of the house. Please change the batteries in both smoke and CO alarms and test them at least monthly to ensure that they are operating. Check the date on your alarms and if they are older than 10 years, replace them with new units. These two life safety tools are critical to you and your family's safety! Fires happen fast and can reach a non-survivable condition in minutes.

I'm currently getting up at 4:30AM a few times a week to get my daughter to the hospital for ongoing appointments. This is out of my comfort zone. I'm not a morning person. I'm a late afternoon person at best. Most days I hit my stride as the sun starts to go down. I'm the proverbial night owl. The good news is that 4:30am is basically night. The bad news is that it really isn't. But because I have no other choice, I'm determined to tackle this new challenge head on. To try to even like it a bit. You morning people already know all the tricks. One of them is of course knowing when to go to bed. My usual habit of my head hitting the pillow at or past midnight just won't cut it. So now we head to bed at 8pm with the hopes of falling asleep by 9. Late night movie binges and midnight snacks have been put on hold. I've bumped a number of other morning routines and absolutions to the night before so as not to delay our carefully timed morning departure. I don't want to get up a minute earlier than I have to. I'm also not allowed to hit the snooze button these days. Preparing items for departure is also now done the evening before with army-like precision. Sleeping in my clothes remains a viable and tempting option. Or choosing pajamas that can pass as clothes. Sleeping in the car is not an option but there is a lovely hotel right near the hospital that is in my head as a backup plan and was discussed as an option during the winter months when being snowed-in was a possibility. Not to jinx it but we seem to have gotten a pass on that this year. Because of pre-procedure fasting there is no breakfast required in the mornings before we go, thank heavens. And the Robin's coffee shop at the hospital is open 24-7 so momma can still get a much needed coffee when we arrive. So thankfully the logistics are working themselves out. Daughter is a superstar and never once complains. I might survive, but that whole embracing it part is still a work in progress. I have to be at least slightly cheerful - because I have to set the tone for . So I HER. So I talk about it like it is an adventure. There is some award winning acting involved. Apparently there is a movement with people around the globe committing to getting up at 5:00AM to start their day when they don't even have to. People rave about the benefits. How it gives them a better start to their day. How they are more productive. And how they are very tired come bed time. I'm not sold on it yet and don't think this new early morning routine is likely to become an ingrained habit for me and really have no desire to make it one. But I am still okay with trying to see the bright side of these dark mornings. It really does feel like a different world. Like we are sneaking around with the possibility of seeing and hearing things that would otherwise be 'secret'. There is a moment of excitement when we round the corner on top of the hill and see a glimpse of the city lights in the distance. It reminds us that we aren't the only ones up, and that the world never really sleeps. My daughter is pretty fascinated with that notion. So as we drive to town we look for all the signs of people being 'up'. Naturally the farmers are early risers and we applaud them for their dedication. We acknowledge that we could NEVER be farmers. We drive by houses with the kitchen lights on and know there are moms prepping breakfast and making lunches and will shortly be getting kids up and off to school. We applaud them too, and are thankful we were homeschoolers. We note that the airport never closes. That some stores never close. That the hospital never closes. That there are announcers on the radio. By the time we get to town there is more traffic and that leads to conversations about where people are coming from or going to and what jobs or occupations require these crazy hours. We drive by the fire station and acknowledge the dedicated firefighters on the night shift. We talk to stay awake but also to let this new look at the world sink in so we don't forget it. We are making memories. And while I'm not promising I'll get up at 4:30AM unnecessarily down the line, there is definitely something to be said for stepping out of your comfort zone every now and then and trying new things. As spring approaches and with it feelings of growth and rebirth I hope you'll look for your own opportunity to stretch yourself in new directions too. Right now I need a nap.

Just Popping In... Gone But Not Forgotten by Karen Craib

Hello. Happy New Year and Happy National Pig Day. It will be a solemn one this year. I may not even organize coffee with friends. I feel as sad about losing Esther as if I actually lived with her.

When I worked I thought maybe I'd get a pig when I retired. But...I suspect the cats and dogs would become second class citizens. So I've never done it

Even though Steve surprised Derek with Esther I don't think I'd get away with a pig. I've done it with cats - Nermal and Pommey. Jim was golfing when I brought Nermal home. For months he would say "take that cat back". Maybe this is why I love the Cheetos "when did we get a cat" commercial. Shortly after my Dad died I got Pommey. I took him to the car dealership where Jim worked. Nobody should have been surprised that I got a cat. That cat got me through a lot. And it's hard to explain but I always felt that he took care of me.

One sleepless night I was thinking about people I met when I was a volunteer visitor at a Seniors Home. I've written about how much I enjoyed it. I resigned in 2022 shortly after my mother in law's passing.

It all began when my friend Dorothy was in the Alzheimer ward. I got to know other residents. A few months after Dorothy's passing it began to volunteer.

Before that I had already met Mary, a delightful woman from Newfoundland. She talked about her family and told me how she survived a tornado. I Googled the tornado she talked about and yes...she had survived it. Her husband died a few days after it.

She kept asking me to take her for a drive. So - I Googled her daughter, found out where she worked and emailed her there. She lived in a town a few hours away. She replied "How did you ever find me". I answered "I work in the Reference department". She gave her ok and I took Mary for many drives. We once stopped at Tim Hortons for coffee. As we left she very loudly sang "I'se the B'y".

One day as we walked into the home holding hands, wearing burgundy jackets I said "oh Mary, we're like sisters".

Then one day I went to see her and she was gone, her daughter moved her to her town. I actually had lunch with her daughter once when she was in town. I missed Mary when she left. I considered going to visit her but at that point her daughter didn't think she'd know me.

I was asked to visit Mamie. Every day she was packing to go home. She was a spitfire. I really liked her.

She had a rural background, we would talk about farm life. We shared a love of animals. I think my most memorable visit was the day a therapy dog came in. Her face just lit up.

Her son lived in South America, I forget which country. He came to see her once. I hoped to run into him but didn't. Her knew of my existence. Mamie felt like a kindred spirit, I really liked her.

Four days after my first chemotherapy I had a call from the home to tell me she had passed away. I was sad but at that point I was too distracted by what my body was going through. The timing made her loss easier on me. I later emailed her son and he thanked me for visiting his Mom.

Next, or maybe it was at the same time I began visiting Ellie. The first time I saw her she was wearing a sun hat and reading a newspaper and I thought "that's me".

She used to live in the country. We talked about that a lot as well as her family and her dogs Pal and Little Pal.

At one point she told me she knew who my Mom was. She talked about her coming into the Legion, showing a little piece of fur and everyone laughing. I thought - there's something missing from that story. One day she told me again. This time my Mom said "Do you like my tail". That was it...yep, she knew my Mom.

I enjoyed our visits. I often brought her an out of town newspaper.

Ellie's husband passed away. I asked the nurses if she knew so I could send a card. I wasn't going to visit for a while but changed my mind. Her room was empty. She had passed away very soon after her husband. I called Jim from my car, crying and saying "I can't visit anyone today".

I sent a card to her daughter. I wanted to share the things about her family life, children and pets that we chatted about. I know I soak up any stories about my parents.

I was so glad I had met Ellie.

My last big relationship was with a man. Like Ellie I first spotted Gunther reading a newspaper. I asked if he was interested in out of town newspapers and he was. I'd keep any newspapers we picked up on vacation to give to him.

I think the thing we talked about the most was vacations, especially to Minnesota. He'd tell me how he used to go a lot but didn't any more. And he'd always talk about the Cascades Restaurant, not far past Grand Marais. We got to the point were he'd talk about the restaurant and say "you know the one". Whenever I drive by it I think of Gunther.

After he passed away I didn't form any close relationships. I had a few people I'd visit and sometimes if I was in a group it was almost a party atmosphere. Talking to one woman Marie was like talking to myself. She liked birds, squirrels, cats, dogs etc. I was unable to visit her during the pandemic and she too has passed away.

Volunteer visiting was so rewarding. I considered it in 1996 after my Dad died. A friend asked how I'd cope with losing a resident and I realized - not well. But by 2011 I was ready to do it. I'd already lost a few senior friends and I could cope better.

If you've ever considered doing this, go for it. You won't regret it.

I hope you have a pleasant March and a Happy Easter. Spring is just around the corner. Bye for now.



Kakabeka Falls Generating Station (GS) is one of 11 hydroelectric generating facilities owned and operated by Ontario Power Generation (OPG) in northwestern Ontario. The station is currently 117 years old, (2nd oldest station in OPG's hydroelectric fleet across Ontario) and much of its original equipment from 1906 is still in operation. The station generates clean, reliable power at a peak output of about 24 megawatts (MW) – enough to power about 25,000 homes.

Like all hydro stations, Kakabeka Falls GS has a life expectancy, and it is expected to reach its end of life in the next few years. In preparation, OPG has committed to redeveloping the station to ensure it can continue to reliably generate sustainable energy, while improving public safety, optimizing power generation, and more efficiently use the available river flows.

The engineering design phase for the station's redevelopment will continue until the end of 2024, with the anticipated construction phase to begin in 2025 and be completed in 2027. The proposed redevelopment of the Kakabeka Falls GS will consist of the following upgrades to the station:

- ➤ The four existing generators in the original powerhouse will be removed. The original powerhouse will remain as a local heritage building to house equipment.
- An additional structure, behind the old powerhouse, will be built to house two new Francis type turbines and generators.
- ▶ Replace existing surge building used to absorb water pressure changes when line interruptions occur.
- Remove the four existing penstocks and replace them with two new penstocks.

These upgrades will increase the stations output by about 3 MW, or approximately a 13% increase from its current capacity. In addition, the life of the station is expected to be extended by another 90 years. Kakabeka Falls Generating Station has been part of the community of Kakabeka Falls for over a century, and these improvements will position the station to be part of the community for the next generation.

Between now and the project's end, a substantial amount of work must be completed. You will start to see activity on the site with contractors coming and going throughout 2024 performing engineering design work. In early 2025, the 2-year construction phase will start which will further increase the amount of work on site. OPG is committed to providing updates and will continue to share information throughout the project.





Such changing activities, problems and purposes, may well prevent museums from ever again stagnating as they did around the year 1900 when they were referred to as mausoleums and morgues, and held in low esteem by the public. During both world wars and the interval between-a scant 20 years scientific know-how was accelerated greatly due to the national emergency. This created a great contrast, in weaponry, transportation, communication, etc. From the simple machine age of the 'teens', we had reached the atomic age of 'the forties'. At no time in history had such an advance taken place in so short a time. Museums received an upsurge in popularity by young and old.

As the years rolled by, 'antiques' became collector's items because of their increased scarcity, their expert craftsmanship, and their personal identity with another age. Museums became reference areas where one could see, compare, and ascertain information and background on any item-they became status symbols. Museums were now able to give the

public tangible services rather than the more passive viewing of earlier days. This was a most important development for increased public awareness.

Recognition of the museum as an active educational institution began in a small way when John Ruskin stated that a museum should not only exhibit objects but should make some effort to interpret them to the public.

CROCKPOT CALICO BEANS

4 slices of bacon

1 lb. of ground beef

1/2 cup chopped onion

1 can molasses pork and beans

1 can kidney beans rinsed and drained rinsed and drained

1 can lima beans

1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup ketchup

1 tablespoon vinegar

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon mustard

Cook the bacon and cut into pieces. Add the ground beef and onion. Cook on medium heat. Put bacon, onion and ground beef into a crock pot.

Add the remaining ingredients. Put into a crockpot.

Put the crockpot on high 3 to 4 hours or on low from 6 to 8 hours

OR put into a casserole dish and into the oven for 45 to 60 minutes. Bake at 325 degrees.

Marie's second recipe is great for those people who cannot consume refined white or brown sugar .The sweetener substitute is called Splenda. However, if you don't mind white sugar the Splenda can be substituted using a one to one ratio. In other words, one cup of Splenda can be substituted using one cup of white sugar. These cookies really are delicious especially with a hot cup of coffee or tea.

PEANUT BUTTER WHOLE WHEAT SPLENDA COOKIES

1 and 1/4 cups of whole wheat flour

1/2 tsp.salt

1 tsp.baking powder

1/2 cup shortening or butter

1/2 cup peanut butter smooth or crunchy

1 cup packed Splenda

1/2 tsp. vanilla

1 egg

White sugar/Splenda for fork pressing

Optional: Add 1 cup chocolate chips

Sift together the flour, salt and baking powder.

Cream shortening with the peanut butter and sugar. Beat in the vanilla and egg.

Stir in the flour mixture, blending well.

Shape into 1 inch balls. Place them onto parchment paper or place on greased baking sheets.

Dip a fork into sugar before flattening the cookies.

Bake at 325 degrees for about 10 to 12 minutes.

They, as individuals, and along with family members, who are descendants of this group of intrepid immigrants, who left their families, their homelands, their language and their culture, for the great unknown of Canada, on a "wing and a prayer ", and, with hopefully a name and an address of some unknown relative, who may welcome them and support them on their arrival in the "Great White

Their arrivals here were with an expectation by their sponsors / relations that they "get down to task" to support themselves and secure employment.

The great majority were up to the challenge, and through their endeavours created the communities that we live in today; albeit, there were many rough times for all involved along this path.

Recognition of the history of our forebears who have provided for the life and times that we thrive in today, is part of what Oliver Paipoonge Heritage Park, (OPHP) represents.

The OPHP, in its origin, was established by Fred Goodfellow. He had a passion for history and heritage, and most significantly for the Oliver Paipoonge and surrounding areas.

He started his collecting and historical vision early in his life and amassed an amazing collection at the Hwy 61 / Gillespie Road property, which he continued to build on throughout his life.

With the addition of the Duke Hunt Museum Collection and more recently with the Russ Wanzuk Automotive / Racing Heritage, and the Brill buses collection. there is at this site the most significant, if not the "finest" heritage collection of memorabilia representing primarily the rural activities of the areas, in and around Thunder Bay.

Russ was a very special person; a thinker, a doer, and a one who enjoyed life. He was most notably known for his love of everything relating to cars. He told me once that he started rebuilding cars when he was sixteen and he probably kept most of them. If you ever had the pleasure of visiting his home, it was most evident where his passion was. There are at least 3 garages plus sheds, and they were always full of cars, trucks, race cars, soap box cars, bumper cars, and toy cars. And don't forget to check out the areas beside the garages. But it didn't stop with the cars. If you looked up a little there was the memorabilia on the walls. T-shirts, jackets, hats, posters, pictures, and on and on. And each item had a history which he was more than willing to share. For many years, his dream was to have a facility to display his collection in. Since he was on the Oliver Paipoonge Museum board, now called the Oliver Paipoonge Heritage Park, it only made sense that his dream be built on that site. In July of 2022, 'Russ's Garage' was unveiled to the public. His enthusiasm was overwhelming. He would talk about how he could move things around, add a little something here or there, and it would always be a fresh view for the people coming to visit. This was the Russ that I knew.

Russ had other sides as well. He was a teacher for 32 years and he kept his connections with some of the schools who would call on him for assistance on projects. An example was a small bulldozer that he guided students to build in their shop class and it now sits in Russ's Garage.

Russ loved car races and he was a fixture at the new Thunder Bay Speedway on race days. As expected, he supported the event by bringing display race cars that had some history with the racers and fans.

At most events that Russ attended you would probably see Elaine at his side. For 47 years they enjoyed life together.

We will miss you, Russ! What a special collection that you have left for everyone to enjoy.
