Items from the 1972 Thesis written by Fred Goodfellow, founder of the OP Heritage Park

"Museums...Their Operation and Educational Values"

Primitive objects are able to bridge the gap between the simple and the complex thus allowing for easier assimilation.

Museums provide for the senior citizens a stage where they become the 'stars'—grandchildren and great grandchildren slowly and imperceptibly will gain more respect and greater understanding for their earlier kin—even more so when their questioning minds find that 'Granny and Gramps are oral dictionaries in a very real sense, There is nothing so gratifying (except a donation to help our cause) as the tears of nostalgia which flow when these celebrities find objects of their youth. In their tired eyes, flame replaces smoke, whispers are changed to enthusiastic chatter, and the touches of arthritis seemed to have mysteriously disappeared—at least momentarily.

Museums provide actual proof of the art, skill and imagination of our ancestors, and help to create within the observer an enhanced appreciation and insight into their accomplishments done with relatively simple tools. It becomes self-evident that the early craftsman took great pains and pride in his profession. Values to him were not so much monetary but rather the respect of his fellow man. Time was of little consequence and no detail too minute to incorporate, if the aesthetic quality of his product could be heightened.

Oft has been said, "Buy a name brand", which at times can be shallow advertising-but not so the character of the pioneer whose works consistently displayed balance, symmetry, precision, and a rigid conformity to the craft disciplines of the day. These artisans lived by the proverb, 'the reward for good work is more work' and they were always busy.

In the following chapters our musings will be oriented towards those criteria which can provide for the individual at any age level an environment most suitable for the attainment of knowledge—not always with an arterial facility but rather in a challenging vein. 





CHIEF'S CORNER by Sean Horan, Fire Chief

November 5 is daylight savings when we turn our clocks back one hour. More importantly daylight savings is the reminder to change the batteries on our smoke/CO alarms.

When you change your clock back, please remember to change the battery in all your smoke alarms and CO alarms in your home. Remember, even hard-wired smoke and CO alarms have battery backup. If the battery is removable, it should be changed at least once a year.

It is also important to remember that smoke and CO alarms have a service life. Refer to the owner's manual to see when the manufacturer recommends you replace the alarm. If you can't find a replacement date or don't know how old they are, I recommend you change the unit. When you install a new alarm, mark the installation date on the alarm. Smoke or CO alarms should never go past 10 years in service.

Another important practice is testing

your alarms. It is good practice to test your alarms at least once a month, and if you have been away from home for any length of time, test them as soon as you get home. There are documented cases of smoke alarms failing while the family is away on vacation, with the family coming home and assuming their alarms are working. If your alarm has a "ten year" battery, it is absolutely critical that you test the alarm every month to ensure it will operate when it counts.

With our busy lives and hectic schedules, it is easy to let the monthly test slip by. Try scheduling a family movie night that starts with a smoke/CO alarm test, review of your escape plan and fire safety check on the house.

Be safe and remember- Prevention is the best way to fight fire!





This month in Be Prepared I want to talk a little about cyber attacks. Many of us don't think this is a threat for us personally. Cyber criminals focus on big business and the extremely wealthy, right. Wrong! I found this out the hard way. I personally got hit a couple months ago. Without too much personal information, I checked my credit card and noticed several thousand dollars in charges that occurred within a very short time, like three days. All the charges were small amounts, but there were a couple hundred charges. I reported the incident, and I was able to clear the issue up without too much pain, so I consider myself lucky.

What I learned was that we are all vulnerable to cyber attacks. I make it a practice to check my credit card every two weeks. Had I not been checking my card on a regular basis, who knows

how far my situation would have gone. Some key things you can do to protect yourself:

- Use strong passwords or passphrases. They should be a minimum of 15 characters and made up of random characters. The use of birthdays, anniversaries or pet names are too easy for attackers to guess.
- Use different passwords for each account, and NEVER give your password out.
- Only log in from trusted sources. Never log in via an email that was sent to you.
- Ensure proper security and privacy settings are activated on your device. Social media sites offer information to attackers. NEVER post personal information on social media.
- Watch you credit cards and bank accounts on regular intervals. This will ensure you pick up on unusual activities quickly.

The Rural Pharmacist: Flu Shots and New COVID Vaccines Now Available

Trick or treat! We've got a new flavour of COVID vaccine and flu shot now available! Leave your pillowcase candy sacks at home, roll up those sleeves and show me that shoulder.

The new Moderna and Pfizer COVID vaccines (XBB.1.5) are now available at both Evergreen Pharmacy locations in Kakabeka Falls and Rosslyn. The Moderna and Pfizer vaccine can be received by any person, regardless of whether they have received Pfizer or Moderna vaccines in the past. We also have both the 65+ Senior High Dose Flu Shot and Standard Flu Shot in stock. As with the COVID vaccines, the vaccines are subject to availability as per deliveries from the Ministry of Health.

How long to wait between COVID-19 vaccine doses? The current guidance from the Ministry states that COVID doses may be given if at least 6 months have passed since the individual's last dose of a COVID-19 vaccine or a COVID infection, regardless of how many boosters they've received. However, with informed consent, eligible individuals may receive a booster dose if at least 3 months have passed since their previous dose. There is a school of thought that getting the new COVID vaccine as soon as you can is

ideal. The new vaccine is the closest match to the current circulating strain and generally the winter months have been the peak season for viruses and infections, including COVID infections.

We have vaccine appointments available at both of our pharmacy locations during regular hours throughout the week. Additionally, once we receive a more stable inventory we plan to open up clinic days so we can vaccinate more people more efficiently. Booking your appointment is easy-peasy. Just head over to our website, evergreenrx.ca, and click on "BOOK YOUR FLU SHOT AND COVID VACCINE APPOINTMENT HERE" on the homepage. From there, select your preferred location, Kakabeka Falls or Rosslyn, to find more information about availability and to book your appointment. We kindly ask that you try to book your appointment online, if possible, or have a family member help you out. This helps us provide safe and efficient services to all of our patients. Plus, it allows you to fill out all the necessary consent forms before coming in for your flu shot or COVID vaccine.



Hopefully, you have picked up one of those large bags of beets on sale along with some cabbage or that you have these two vegetables stored from your garden because I have a great condiment recipe for you. This beet relish is quite easy to make. It's full of nutri-

ents like iron, potassium, fibre and iron. It's wonderful as part of a sandwich or as a fresh condiment with any meat or rice dish if you prefer vegetarian. Worth trying.

NIPPY BEET RELISH

4 cups chopped cooked beets

4 cups chopped cabbage

1 cup grated horseradish

1 tsp. pickling salt

2 cups vinegar

2 cups sugar

Coarsely grind the beets and cabbage. Combine together with the horseradish. You can buy prepared horseradish but do NOT use the creamy horseradish just the plain. Mix well. Sprinkle with the pickling salt.

Scald the vinegar (don't boil it) and dissolve the sugar in the vinegar. Add this to the first mixture into a pot.

Heat all together and cook until the vegetables are clear by simmering five minutes and stirring constantly.

Seal at once in hot sterilized jars. Store in a cool, dry place. Yields 4x2 cup jars.

To keep you warm as winter introduces itself, here's another comforting soup recipe. The Finns call this Kalakeitto. My family calls it Fish Soup. I love the hint of allspice that permeates the milky broth. It contains all the protein, the veggies and the dairy you need for a nutritious lunch or supper. Don't forget to create a side of buttered bread, toast or a sandwich to extend the meal. This will warm you.

FISH SOUP

1 lb.fresh fish fillets ie salmon, trout, pickerel

1 large onion sliced thin or diced

4 cubed potatoes

whole allspice

salt and pepper 1 cup milk

Water

Boil the potatoes, onions with some whole allspice in enough water to cover the potatoes until the potatoes are partially cooked. Add the fish. When the fish appears cooked, stir in 1 cup of milk, preferably whole milk. Add more milk if needed. Reheat gently but do not boil. Season with salt and pepper.
