Now that we are moving into River W.I. Scolder days and nights it's time submitted by to start making soups. Soups are easy to prepare, inexpensive and with the addition of a sandwich make for an easy supper. In the fall we tend to drink less water so soups can keep you hydrated.

They are a good way to use up the garden vegies .A simple chicken soup made by slow cooking chicken, onions, garlic, carrots, celery and some greens like kale or cabbage and herbs, all in a broth or water, produces a soup that's great for a healthy immune system. Soups also freeze well. Here are two easy recipes packed full of vitamins and simple comfort.

IDA's FRENCH PUMPKIN SOUP by Ida Towell

A. Cook over low heat the following for twenty minutes

3 tbsp.butter

2 lbs. pumpkin peeled and diced

1/4 tsp. mace or nutmeg

Add 1 cup water

B. Add 1 cup milk

Salt and pepper

Cook for ten minutes more then use a hand blender or sieve to create a smooth texture.

C. Then add 1/2 cup light cream

Bring just to a boil and serve hot as is with bread and butter or garnish with croutons

Ida wrote this at the end "my mother used to add little homemade dumplings made from egg and flour cut into very small pieces."

Today people often put a dollop of sour cream or a spoonful of plain yogurt into the middle of each bowl.

COUSIN JUDY'S HOMEMADE MUSHROOM SOUP

Simmer 20 minutes 1/2 lb. diced fresh mushrooms 1/4 cup onion 2 chicken cubes 2 cups boiling water

In a large pan melt 1/4 cup butter Add

3 tbsp.flour

1 and 1/2 tsp.salt

1/8 tsp.poultry seasoning

Add 3 cups milk stirring constantly till thick and smooth

Bring to boil and add mushroom mixture

This soup could be garnished with a sprinkle of paprika or black pepper or topped with a fresh herb. Some crusty garlic bread on the side would make a tasty addition.

CHIEF'S CORNER

October is here! October means Fire Prevention Week!

This year, Fire Prevention Week runs from October 8th to 14th and the theme is:

Cooking safety starts with you!

Unattended cooking is a leading cause of home fires in Ontario. Some tips to improve your cooking safety:

- 1) Be Alert- Do not cook if you are sleepy or are impaired by alcohol, drugs or medicine that makes you drowsy.
- 2) Never leave the kitchen while you are cooking. If you must leave, turn the stove off.
- 3) Keep the space around the stove top free of oven mitts, dishcloths, paper towels etc
- 4) Keep a lid that fits the pot or pan that you are cooking with close by. If a fire starts, put the lid on the pot and turn the stove off. Wait until the pot or pan is cold before you take the lid off.
- 5) NEVER try to move a burning pot or pan if it is on fire! If you can not cover it with a lid, and have no means of controlling the fire safely, get yourself and your loved ones out of the house and call 911.

6) Never cook with long or loose clothing that may hang over a hot stove. Clothing can catch fire very easily and quickly.

If Fire Prevention Week is not exciting enough for you, how about Halloween! The one night when all the ghosts and goblins come out to terrorize our neighborhoods. To improve the safety for all creatures roaming the streets, ensure everybody has battery operated flashlights or glowstick to increase visibility. When choosing costumes, consider not using masks that will limit your visibility or costumes with long trailing fabric that increase the risk of tripping.

For all you parents out there, please slow down when driving on Halloween night and watch out for our children!

If you are out trick or treating around the Kakabeka Falls, Rosslyn or Murillo Fire Stations, stop by for some treats and fire safety information for the kids.

Be safe and remember-Prevention is the best way to fight fire!



This month in Be Prepared I want to talk a little about helping our children cope when emergencies happen. I think we can all agree that it is not a matter of IF an emergency is going to happen to us, it is a matter of WHEN an emergency is going to happen. As a parent or guardian, it is important for us to know what to do to help our kids cope with an emergency.

The first thing is to recognize that emergencies can be very stressful for children. We need to be strong and supportive for kids. Children can feel stress deeply and we can't ignore or diminish that stress. As a parent, the key to helping your child cope is simply to be there and make them feel safe and secure.

Some other tips include:

- Take their fears seriously and tell them that it's okay to be scared. Reassure them that they're safe and that you'll continue to help them when they feel afraid.
- Ask your children about their fears, feelings and thoughts on what has happened.
- Explain the events as best you can and

acknowledge what's frightening about what happened.

 Tell your kids what you think and feel. Doing so helps them feel less alone if they know that their feelings are like yours


• Maintain familiar routines, like mealtimes and regular bedtime hours. These are comforting and help reinforce a child's sense of security.

While parents can play a huge role in helping children deal with feelings of anxiety, sometimes it may be helpful to talk to a professional such as a psychologist, social worker, physician, nurse or psychiatrist who can help children understand and cope with their emotions. There is no shame in asking for help for your children, and if you as a parent are struggling with the effects, please reach out for help, for yourself and your children.

The Rural Pharmacist: Flu Shot Season is Around the Corner!

Yes, you read that correctly. I will now be writing the monthly entries of the Rural Pharmacist as your reigning plow match champion! Jokes aside, I want to thank Susan McCrury for inviting Evergreen Pharmacies to attend this year's festival as well as all the other staff members for putting on such a fun event. Since I've proven that I've got the chops to hang with the folks in Slate River, maybe we can convince Henry to try his hand with a plow next year!

Now for the real business: flu shot season is just around the corner. We've had patients inquiring about the flu shot since as early as July and I'm happy to finally make available some concrete information for you. At the time of writing this article, the Ontario Ministry of Health had recently released a statement suggesting that flu shots would be

available by mid-October this year. Don't hold your breath as history would suggest that this is simply an estimate. However, give-or-take a week and, I think we'll likely see shipments arrive at the pharmacy within the second or third week of October.

Do you want to stay informed and find out exactly when we receive stock? Do you want to book your flu shots online and fill out your screening questionnaire before you even arrive at the pharmacy? The solution is simple: JOIN OUR NEWSLETTER! Our intent is not to overwhelm you with content you don't need. We use our online newsletter to share valuable information that we think our patients would appreciate. For example, the availability of flu shots and COVID-19 vaccines, links to online booking for appointments etcetera.

> Joining the newsletter is easy! Simply go to our

website, evergreenrx.ca, and scroll to the bottom of the webpage. When you see "Sign Up For Our Monthly E-Newsletter", enter your email address and hit the sign up button. That's it. If you're having any trouble, give either of our pharmacies a call and staff member will help you out.

Among the vaccines being distributed in Ontario are the Quadrivalent Inactivated Influenzae Vaccine (QIV) and the high-dose Quadrivalent Inactivated Influenzae Vaccine (QIV-HD). Big names, right? Basically, it just means that these inactive (not consisting of live virus) vaccines protect against 4 strains of influenzae virus that we think will be circulating during the flu season this year.

Most individuals 2 years of age and older are eligible for vaccination with the regular quadrivalent vaccine at the pharmacy. In contrast, the high-dose vaccine is reserved for those over the

age of 65. The idea is that as we age, our immune system isn't as effective at recognizing the influenzae vaccine. To counter that, a higher dose is given. However, the amount of high dose vaccines that are distributed is limited. We'll do our part to make sure that the right patients get the right dose. And if stock runs out, no problem! It's much more important to get a dose of regular vaccine than to wait for future stock that may take a while show up. Remember, it will take a few weeks after your injection for the vaccine to become effective.

Stay tuned for information about the most recently approved COVID-19 vaccine. Also, we'll be reporting on the newly approved vaccine for respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). But how will you get this information!? Hmm ... signing up for our newsletter is probably a good start! Until next time. Keep





The Level I Low Water Condition declared on August 3, 2023, for the LRCA Area of Jurisdiction, remains in effect. This declaration is based on one-month and three-month received precipitation and observed flow conditions in area streams when compared to the lowest average summer flows. Affected residents (households utilizing private wells) are advised to monitor their water levels and usage, as they may experience shortages if the lack of precipitation continues into the fall.

Outside of Russ's Garage on full display, is the Bunny Massaro #9 car, the A&W car, the Jeff Marshall/Greg Dupont B Mod that raced up until last year and the Jimmy Bolduc car and trailer. Jimmy, who was a true-life real character, was lost in a tragic accident. Many people brought in and donated family racing photos and memorabilia for the racing facility.

We would like to thank Don Young for helping to organize the event and for providing the luncheon. Also, a big thank you to Johan Vas for doing extra promotions for us. It was so good to see such a large number of the racing community and public come together to support this racing event. Racing in the Thunder Bay area is over 100 years old!

Items from the 1972 Thesis written by Fred Goodfellow, founder of the OP Heritage Park, "Museums...Their Operation and Educational Values"

I had the feeling that people weren't interested in museums!!!

Ironically the help received was from young children that lived nearby. They cleaned and blackened some old box stoves and to this day their names are on a placard proving that they have participated in Canada's Centennial. One child wasn't allowed to return because he had dirtied his clothes and the parents showed no interest in what he had accomplished.

"If we could cure the apathy of parents we wouldn't need to worry about the children".

This museum caters to many tastes. Its diversity, although creating many problems does have the advantage of a wider range of appeal. As a boy of ten, I had the good fortune to visit Henry Ford's Greenfield Village and see at first hand the articles of the interesting and intriguing world of an earlier generation. This experience has not been forgotten and was, I believe, instrumental in giving me a sense of appreciation of the past and a purpose to provide others with a similar opportunity.

This, in brief, is my background for this paper. Entering the year 1972, no interest has yet been shown by educators and still less by tourism officials whose cars pass by daily. An awakening must take place if we wish to instill within the youth an understanding of the problems faced by an earlier generation.

Importance of Museums:

Museums provide links in the chain of history which provide a continuity between past and present cultures as well as a forecast for the future. In our present jet, pet and debt age, and in our philosophy of planed obsolescence, museums must assume ever-increasing responsibilities. The articles of today, due to mass production techniques and high labour costs, do not possess the pride of design or the steadfast qualities of their forbears.

In our sophisticated machine age, viewers, particularly at the elementary level, will have trouble in understanding the operation of those automatons-especially so if early models are not preserved to show the preliminary thinking and fundamental concepts which prefaced the present scientific items in use.
