Public meetings on subdivision applications are a requirement of the Municipality and not of the Province of Ontario. Attendance at a public meeting on a subdivision application required by the Municipality does not entitle attendees to appeal a decision on a subdivision application to the Ontario LandTribunal. Bill 23 passed by the Ontario Legislature on Nov. 28/22removed the general public right of appeal of decisions on subdivision applications from the Planning Act.

DESCRIPTION OF SUBDIVISION APPLICATION 1

Subdivision 1-2022 - Northstar Holdings - The applicant proposes to develop a 12 lot subdivision over lands which are comprised of CON 1 & 2 N/R PTLOT 7. Cooper Road south needs be extended to provide public road access to the proposed subdivision.

Subdivision 2-2022 - 1974862 Ont. Ltd - The applicant proposes to develop a 17 lot, 2 block subdivision over lands which are comprised of PLAN 683 LOT 8 9 19 TO 21 PT ST CLD & CON 1 & 2 N/R PTLOT 8 9 10 AND RP 5 5 1 2 6 8 PARTS 1 TO 3 5. The primary access for this subdivision is off of Vibert Road, with Lots 11-17 proposed to be accessed off of the Cooper Road extension associated with the Easterly subdivision application.



CHIEF'S CORNER by Sean Horan, Fire Chief

Another slow start to the fire season, however this does not mean there is no threat from wildfires. Please be mindful when you are burning debris during spring cleanup. Ensure you have a fire permit and pay close attention to the conditions on the permit. Failure to follow the requirements of the permit will result in a fine.

The Oliver Paipoonge Regional Training Center has successfully completed another Fire Fighter level 1 Certification course in May, with members from Neebing, Oliver Paipoonge, Lappe, Red Rock,

Nipigon, Hearst and Greenstone attending the course. The Fire Fighter 1 Certification course consists of approximately 24 hours of online training and 9 days of practical skills training and one day of testing, both written and practical tests. Successful students will gain NFPA 1001 Fire Fighter Level 1 Certification. The RTC will also be hosting a Drone Pilot course, HazMat Operations Level, another Fire Fighter 1 along with a Fire Fighter 2 course. Very busy with training to ensure our fire fighters and first responders are safe!

I'm extremely proud of the hard work our members have put in to get the RTC off the ground, and extremely proud of the fire fighters that are dedicating the required time to become certified volunteer fire fighters. The dedication and hard work these volunteer fire fighters put in to provide fire protection to their respective communities is nothing short of spectacular.

Thank you to everyone that came out for Emergency Management Week and learned how to get prepared before an emergency strikes!

Does your household have an evacuation plan? Evacuation plans help you know what to do in case of an emergency. It only takes a piece of paper, a pen, and a few minutes of your time.

If your family is not all together when an emergency strikes, discuss how you will contact one-another, where to meet, and what to do in different situations. The more information everyone has, the better.

Once the plan has been completed, make sure to keep it in a safe location where everyone can access it. Make photocopies of the plan and put it in the car, in the house, and anywhere else you may need to refer to it.



Please be advised that Highway 588 at the Kaministiquia River North Bridge, located 1.56 km South of Highway 11 will have a 1 lane closure to facilitate replacement of the superstructure. The Rural Pharmacist:

Need a Fix for all these Ticks! Pharmacist Prescribing Available for Tick Bites

In Canada, climate change has contributed to an increase in the number, types and range of ticks and, subsequently, tick related diseases. Warmer temperatures and milder winters lead to improved tick survival/reproduction and a longer season for tick exposure for humans and animals.

Tick bites do not cause pain to the host at the time of the attachment, but may cause a skin reaction including swelling, itching and inflammation. Because there is no pain at the time of attachment it can be difficult to identify when you've been bit by a tick. It is important to do regular tick checks, especially in warmer areas of the body (armpit, groin, scalp). Once a tick is found it should be removed immediately with fine-tipped tweezers. The area should be washed with soap and water and then disinfected with rubbing alcohol or an iodine swab.

The most common disease transmitted by ticks in Canada is Lyme disease, which is increasing across Canada. Lyme disease symptoms present as a rash (typically a "bullseye" rash), fever, chills, headache, neck stiffness, decreased appetite, muscle and joint pain. Only blacklegged ticks (aka deer ticks) can transmit Lyme disease and the risk of Lyme disease increases when the tick is attached to the host for at at least 24-36 hours. However, since it can be difficult to realize when a tick has bit a host due to no pain at attachment, it may be required to assess the degree of

engorgement of the attached tick; an engorged tick means that it has started to feed on the host and has likely been attached for >24 hours.

Prophylaxis treatment for Lyme disease must be started within 72 hours of tick removal in order to be clinically effective. It's important to seek medical opinion shortly after you discover your tick bite!

Pharmacists can now prescribe for tick bites as a means to prevent Lyme disease as part of the new Minor Ailment programs. Our pharmacists can perform these minor ailment assessments in-person or over the phone by asking a variety of questions to determine if the tick bite is required to be treated by antibiotic to prevent Lyme disease.

Preventing tick bites, along with other insect bites, is important as we enter the summer seasons. Health Canada provides the following guidelines for people entering a tick habitat:

- Wear light-coloured, long-sleevedshirts and pants to spot ticks easily
- Tuck your shirt into your pants, and your pants into your socks
- Wear closed-toe shoes
- Apply insect repellent containing DEET or Icaridin to clothing and exposed skin
- Wear permethrin-treated clothing
- putting clothes on high heat in a dryer for at least 10 minutes before washing clothing after spending time outdoors



Here is a simple but most delicious cookie recipe because it is lemony.

Enough lemon that a five year old guest of mine with a keen palate stopped after two bites and commented on the lemon. He loved the cookie. It comes from a mystery WI member this time. Enjoy. I know that kids of all ages will.

LEMON SUGAR COOKIES

1/2 cup softened butter

1 and 1/4 cup white sugar, divided zest of 1 whole lemon

2 tbsp. fresh lemon juice

1 large egg

1/2 tsp. vanilla extract

1 tsp. baking soda

1/4 tsp. salt

2 cups flour

In a large bowl cream together the butter and 1 cup of the white sugar and beat until light and fluffy.

Mix in the lemon zest, the freshly squeezed lemon juice, egg and vanilla. Slowly add the baking soda, flour and salt. Once well combined, put the batter into a small bowl, cover and refrigerate until well chilled, about 2 to 4 hours or overnite.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper. Shape the cookie dough into smooth balls. Coat well with the remaining sugar. Place the dough balls 3 inches apart on the baking sheet and bake for 12 to 14 minutes until the edges are a slightly golden brown. Transfer the cookies onto a wire rack to cool. These cookies freeze well if they last that long. Great with that cup of tea or coffee out on the deck. Enjoy!

June is National Cytomegalovirus (CMV) Awareness Month!

It is observed annually in June to increase awareness among pregnant women, parents, and healthcare providers. CMV Canada (https://cmvcanada.com/) states that the most common non-genetic and preventable cause of birth defects and hearing loss in infants is due to cCMV.

CMV is a common virus that rarely causes concerns in healthy individuals. However, a pregnant mother can transmit the virus to their fetus, described as congenital cytomegalovirus (cCMV), and according to CMV Canada it is estimated that 1 in 200 infants are infected with CMV during pregnancyn and 1 in 5 of those infants will develop a permanent disability. Prenatal exposure to CMV may result in a host of mild to severe health and developmental consequences that affect the infant's quality of life. This includes hearing loss, seizures, visual impairments or visual loss, intellectual disability and even death. Reducing the risk of CMV transmission includes washing hands, not sharing food or drinks with your young children, and cleaning toys and other surfaces that come into contact with children's saliva, especially while you are pregnant.

CMV and cCMV awareness is limited and combined with the limitations of access to healthcare services in remote and rural areas of Northern Ontario, a research project with Lakehead University wishes to understand the lived experiences of caregivers who have children with cCMV, as well as gain their perspectives on accessing and receiving CMV healthcare services in Ontario in an interview. The project is titled "The Lived Experiences of Caregivers of Children With Congenital Cytomegalovirus (cCMV) Receiving Healthcare in Northwestern Ontario." Through gaining a better understanding of caregivers' lived experiences with having a child with cCMV in Northwestern Ontario, this project hopes to advocate for health equity for this unique population in our surrounding communities.
