The association and its chapters share common goals of providing information and education, supporting research, and advocating for programs and services for the autism community.

NOW THEREFORE I, LUCY KLOOSTERHUIS, Mayor of the Municipality of Oliver Paipoonge do hereby declare April 2, 2024, as "WORLD AUTISM AWARENESS DAY" within the limits of the Municipality of Oliver Paipoonge.





BY-LAWS/ RESOLUTIONS PASSED

With respect to Report 2024.35 Council authorizes the passing of a by-law to amend the Municipality of Oliver Paipoonge Comprehensive Zoning By-law to rezone GFL Environmental Inc, 26 Haniak Road property from light to heavy industrial; That the Disconnecting From Work Policy be approved; The contribution of services valued at \$13,270.00 in 2023/23 to Rural 60 Plus be approved; Approval of the 2024/25 Municipal Insurance program for a premium of \$310,740 plus taxes and 2024/25 cyber insurance for a premium of \$8,810 plus taxes; Supporting a resolution regarding flashing lights on stop signs in highway construction zones; Support of a resolution that the Federal Gov't commit additional funds for cost sharing of Provincial firefighting and to consider the development of a national strategy of firefighting; Support of a resolution to advocate to the AMO, ROMA and FCM to examine if the unaffordability of water and wastewater systems operations costs is systemic provincially and nationally.

For the Love of Cars

I spend so much time in my car it's almost a second home. I end up eating a lot of meals and snacks there. I have lots of personal supplies handy. And on a cold snowy winter day (or spring day as the case may be) when I still have to be out and about, I appreciate the warmth and comfort of my car. Music, coffee, essential oil diffuser. I make it work! Not that I have a fancy car or anything. Or a clean car for that matter. Somehow my impeccable housekeeping skills in no way transfer to my car. Now, I'm married to a mechanic which means that many things in my life, including my car, are often held together with duct tape or other contraptions. There is usually at least one light on, on my dash. In fact I sometimes get worried when there are no lights on. It is the norm for me to hear things like 'don't worry about it' or 'just keep driving' or 'it's nothing important' when I bring potential mechanical issues to his attention. I have driven around for weeks with unidentified noises or waiting for something to fall off that apparently I 'don't really need anyway'. Most days I just turn up the radio and embrace the adventure. I don't want to stereotype but I know for sure that my car looks nothing like the 'city' cars I see. For one thing it's hard to identify the actual colour of my car. That comes with the territory when you live at the end of a long dirt road. There is no use in washing my car or heaven forbid spending money on a car wash in town. One drive back up the hill and it's back to being dirty again. I get a kick out of it when I see other 'country' cars on the road. You know the ones. Cars (or often trucks) that you know have a history. That have seen better days but probably have so many stories to tell if they could talk. I don't judge. Maybe there's a tail light missing. They probably never even had hubcaps. The antenna might be broken. A window might be stuck up or down or covered with plastic or even cardboard. They might have to open the door at the drive-thru. Forget about bluetooth or back-up cameras or other fancy features. There's probably a dog in the back. These are the people with the 'beater' cars that have been brought back to life and simply get you from point A to point B. Because the truth is not all of us can afford a brand new fresh off the lot vehicle, and I know I never will. And that's okay. Some of my best car memories involve old beaten up cars. From childhood outings to stock car races, to some of our own backcountry stock car adventures. I grew up a city kid but we had aunts and cousins in the country. Including older 'boy' cousins who were always taking us on adventures. They always had cars and always started to drive at a young age. We were mesmerized and always 'went along for the ride'. Nothing they had was really road-worthy but they were definitely 'field' worthy. There is nothing quite like racing around a back road or farmer's field in a hot-wired car with no windows, getting wacked with the occasional tree branch, inhaling various bugs, sitting on the bench seat in the back and hanging on for dear life to that 'rope' that hung across the seat in front of you (never was quite sure what that was for) while an older and probably too young to drive legally cousin showed his city slicker guests what real fun was and scared the pants off us at the same time. Based on the number of giant boulders we swerved and missed and sometimes didn't, and the general insanity of it all, I'm not sure how we all survived. But we did. And we dared not show that we were afraid or tell our parents how totally hairy the rides were or they might not let us come back. Winter months we switched to snow machines and it was just as dangerous and exciting, nothing like we had ever experienced 'back in town' - which was only a half hour away but seemed like a whole different world! Not sure if it made me love or hate driving but the memories are forever. I didn't get my driver's license till I was in my 20's (living in Toronto it's just not necessary) and didn't have my first car till I moved to the country myself in my 30's. I can't help but think it's all connected somehow. Country driving continues to be one of my



favourite things (though I stick to the roads now!) Whether it's driving from Slate River to town once or twice a day, or country drives Murillo or Hymers or other destinations to run errands. When the weather cooperates and you have the right snacks and the right copilot these mini road trips can be simply the best and I never say no when the opportunity arises! Stay safe on the roads everyone, and no matter how fancy or not fancy your car is, make memories and embrace the ride!

Oh excuse me a minute, the washer is done. Ok - I'm back.

I liked the elephants. But as an adult I think...what a life. Most of it spent in a truck driving from town to town, and in between you perform. Hmmmm. That's not unlike Michael Buble on tour.

I'm reminded of the killer whale show at Marineland. We were there in the 80's on a day when the whale was clearly not interested in performing. Soon after it entered the big pool it swam back into the little one and used its head to slam the gate shut. That's making a statement.

DO YOU NEED A BUILDING PERMIT?

A building permit is your formal permission to begin construction or demolition. It means that the Municipality of OliverPaipoonge has approved plans for any new structure, addition or renovation. Approved plans must comply with the Ontario Building Code, local zoning by-laws, and other applicable laws and regulations. It is unlawful to start construction or demolition of a building, as defined in the building code, before you get a permit.

You need a building permit in the following situations:

- Construct a new building
- Renovate, repair or add to a building
- Demolish or remove all or a portion of a building
- Change a building's use
- . Install, change or remove partitions and load-bearing walls
- Make new openings for, or increase the size of, doors and windows
- * Build a garage, balcony or deck
- Excavate a basement or construct a foundation
- Install or modify heating, plumbing, air conditioning systems or fireplaces

CHIEF'S CORNER

Corner – April 2024

I'm somewhat confused with the weather as I write the April Chief's Corner. Last week we were enjoying double digit temperatures and facing a building fire hazard. Today it is snowing with a winter storm warning and potentially 50+ cm of snow! Don't get me wrong, we need snow as we are currently in a severe drought, but it goes to show you how fast things can change. This snow will help our situation in the short term, but our spring fire hazard will be back before you know it.

The spring wildfire season is the most dangerous time of the year, with dry fuels, low humidity, and windy conditions. As another reminder, and as outlined in our open-air burning by-law, our burning permit and the FFPA (Forest Fire Prevention Act), outdoor burning is restricted during the fire season from April 1 to October 31. Burning is permitted from 2 hours before sunset to 2 hours after sunrise, with a valid permit. There is NO DAYTIME BURNING permitted during the fire season. This includes piles that may be smoldering the next day. They must be extinguished before the next burning period. The time restriction is to ensure burning is conducted at the safest time of the day. If you have piles that have been burnt over the winter, it is your responsibility to ensure these are OUT effective April 1st.

Just a reminder that you may be charged if you are burning without a valid permit OR if you are burning outside the requirements outlined in the permit. You may also be responsible for the cost of extinguishing a fire. This could be a substantial amount of money!

As outlined in the burning permit, ensure you always have a responsible person on site, along with extinguishing items available to control any burning that may get out of hand. IF IT'S WINDY DON'T BURN!!! If you have ANY problems controlling a fire, call 911 immediately. The sooner the fire department arrives, the faster the fire can be controlled. It is also the permit holder's responsibility to know the burning conditions and if there are any burning restrictions, such as restricted fire bans (RFZ). Visit the Municipal website (http://www.oliverpaipoonge.ca/) for information related to open air burning and any restrictions that may be in place.

As an added measure of protection during the forest fire season, the Fire Smart Homeowner's Manual is a quick guide that provides property owners with information and steps you can take to reduce the risk of losses in a wildfire event. The manual deals with site preparation and maintenance, as well as building materials, and includes a checklist for home and site hazard assessment. 

old. Her summary says it all. (It's also interesting to note that Graham flour is a coarse whole grain flour named after Sylvester Graham, from the 1830's, the Father of Vegetarianism who believed even then that we should be eating plant based foods.)

JEAN'S BLUEBERRY SURPRISE

Back in the 50s and 60s, my mother worked in the kitchen at Club 17. Those were the days when all good eating establishments made everything from scratch. Someone gave her a recipe for a Blueberry Cheese Cake, and like all good cooks she tweaked it and came up with her version and named it Blueberry Surprise. It went over real big with their customers! She always make it for our special gatherings, we loved it and all these years later her two granddaughters make it for their friends on special occasions.

GRAMMA B'S BLUEBERRY SURPRISE

Set oven at 350

Crust: 1 1/4 cup crushed graham wafers 1/4 cup melted butter 2 tbsp. milk

Mix well, pack firmly in 11 x 13 pan. (put in hot oven for about 5 min)

Mix 1 8oz. package of cream cheese, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 eggs and 1/2 tsp vanilla. Beat well and spread over crust, add 1 can blueberry pie fill and cook about 15 min.

Cool and add 1/2 pint whipcream or you can use dreamwhip.

Responsibility and Functions:

"A museum is a non-profit permanent establishment not existing primarily for the purpose of conducting temporary exhibitions, exempt from Federal and Provincial government income taxes, open to the public and administered in the public interest, for the purpose of conserving and preserving, studying, interpreting, assembling and exhibiting to the public for its instruction and enjoyment, objects and specimens of educational and cultural value including artistic, scientific (whether animate or inanimate,) historical and technological material. Museums thus defined shall include art galleries, art exhibit centres, botanical gardens, zoological parks, aquaria, planeteria, historical society museums and historic houses, preservation projects and sites which meet the requirements set forth in the preceding sentence.

From the foregoing paragraph, a most important responsibility is proper interpretation. This would depend greatly upon the use of proper display techniques which will be enlarged upon in a subsequent chapter. If an establishment is trying to tell an historical story the object must be seen in chronological sequence so greater clarity will result. Research facilities, the rounding-out process, should be provided to aid this interpretation to its greatest extent. (to be continued in the next issue)

Here's a couple of items for the April column of **BE PREPARED**. First is a reminder about our disaster preparedness kit (72-hour kit). We have talked about what these kits are and why it is important to have one, but it is just as important to make sure our kits are updated and current. Critical paperwork gets updated throughout the year, so we need to ensure our kits have the most current copies. Items in our kits, such as medications and food items have expiry dates on them, so we need to rotate those supplies. Spare clothes become too big or too small over time. A change in season will also require your kit to be updated. Given we are in a transition from winter to summer, it is a good time to update our kits. Experience has shown that emergencies can happen very quickly leaving no time to gather items. A well stocked kit will help you and your loved ones get through the first couple days of a disaster.

Each kit should be tailored to individual needs, however should be small enough to be easily carried and contain some basic items. Some items to consider:

- Water-at least 2 litres per person per day. Consider small containers to make it easier to carry.
- Food that won't spoil such as energy bars, dried foods etc.
- Spare set of clothing
- Flashlight with spare batteries
- Radio with spare batteries
- Well stocked first aid kit
- Spare keys, auto, home etc.Some cash in small bills
- Emergency Plan with contact information
- Critical paper work such as insurance policies, personal documents, memory stick with family photos etc.
- Hygiene kit with toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, feminine hygiene products, hand sanitizer, N95 masks, toilet paper, etc.
- Sleeping bag or blankets
- Safety gear such as safety glasses, gloves
- If you have children, ensure you have spare clothes, diapers, food along with toys and games to keep them occupied.
- Don't forget your pets. You should have food, leashes and supplies to clean up after your animal.

Lastly, **May 5th to the 11th is Emergency Preparedness Week**. The theme this year is "Plan for every season" Living in the North, our seasons seem to be forever in change mode, with each season presenting different challenges. We certainly need to be prepared for each one of them.

You never know where or when there is going to be an emergency. Being prepared is critical to safely navigate your way through an emergency or disaster.
